

EARLY WINTER HOLIDAY FOR KORIANNE AND PAUL Casa Rural El Recuerdo and Birding Extremadura 21st – 28th November 2023



Itinerary

- 21st November 2023: Pick-up at Seville airport and afternoon at Hornachos.
- 22nd November 2023: Plains between Cáceres and Trujillo

TRIP REPORT

21st November 2023: Pick-up at Seville airport and afternoon at Hornachos.

Martin met Korianne and Paul at Seville airport at 11.00 and we headed straight onto the ringroad and then onto the motorway heading north to Extremadura. Early morning fog had lifted and it was fairly overcast as we entered Extremadura, the landscape changing from the arable land near Seville to the dehesas and plains of southern Extremadura. We drove straight to the Sierra Grande de Hornachos, where a small town lay nestled below the crags, on top of which was an Arab fortress. As soon as we got out of the car we found our target species, a pair of **Black Wheatears**. A further pair was seen further along the short walk that we took. We also had excellent views of **Thekla Lark** and **Black Redstart**. The olive groves had **Blackcaps**, **Sardinian Warblers** and **Robins**. **Crag Martins** soared overhead, whilst higher still were groups of **Griffon Vulture** and an impressive **Cinereous Vulture**. **Red Kites** were numerous.



On the way to our next spot we had a good view of a juvenile **Spanish Imperial Eagle**. We spent the remainder of the afternoon at a viewpoint near Chozos de Llera. We failed to see Iberian Lynx, but saw **Raven**, **Red-legged Partridge**, **Green Sandpiper** and were teased by at least one **Dartford Warbler** and several **Iberian Green Woodpeckers**, heard but not seen.

We arrived at Casa Rural El Recuerdo at 18.45, welcomed by Claudia.

22nd November 2023: Plains between Cáceres and Trujillo

It was a beautiful day of clear sky, sunshine with little wind. We headed west towards the provincial capital of Cáceres and then entered the plains lying between Cáceres and Trujillo. On a Roller nest box we saw the first two of three **Little Owls** for the day. The vast almost treeless landscape often gives an empty feel, but as soon as one stops and starts looking, birds will be found. So it was today. At our first stop we a majestic male **Great Bustard.** There were

Calandra Larks and Common Chiffchaffs and a fine male Hen Harrier quartered a field, being mobbed by Northern Lapwings. Further along the same trail, we found a group of Black bellied Sandgrouse resting on the ground. On our return a delightful pair of Spanish Imperial Eagles sat together on a pylon. At a third stop, we found a flock of Pin-tailed Sandgrouse on the ground.



Just south of the village of Santa Marta de Magasca we were treated to a close juvenile **Spanish Imperial Eagle** and ubiquitous **Red Kites**. After an excellent coffee break in the village we stopped beside the Magasca River.



Back on the plains we had our picnic and then walked on an ancient drovers' trail. Here we found a flock of nearly 40 Little Bustard and a distant flock of Pin-tailed Sandgrouse. We watched a Merlin successfully catch a Meadow Pipit in flight.

On our way back to Trujillo, stops along the road yielded **Spanish Sparrow**, more **Iberian Grey Shrikes** and **Iberian Magpies**.

We stopped in the main square of Trujillo to admire the wonderful historic centre of the town, and then took a circular walk up to the castle and through the medieval part of the town. **Common Cranes** passed overhead, calling, whilst around the buildings were **Crag Martins** and **Black Redstarts**, as well as **Spotless Starlings**.



23rd November 2023: Madrigalejo and Palazuelo rice fields

A fresh start to the day with some ice on the windscreen of the car and a wind with a nip to it during the latter part of the morning, but cloudless skies and very pleasant in the afternoon.

South of Zorita we crossed the plains and then entered the rice fields near Madrigalejo, seeing two **Black-winged Kite**. Beside a small flooded gravel put, **Cetti's Warblers** were singing and a male **Red Avadavat** was building a nest. Everywhere there were **Common Cranes**, parties calling inflight, others feeding in the fields. Over the fruit orchards there were flocks of **Iberian Magpies** and we saw a rather fine **Iberian Grey Shrike**.

We explored the rice fields north of the village of Vegas Altas, having excellent views of a female **Merlin** and many **Common Cranes**. We found a flock of **Yellow-crowned Bishops** and also **Common Waxbills**.



We stopped for lunch beside the Ruercas River, where there were hordes of **Common Chiffchaff** and very vocal **Water Rails** .



The afternoon was spent on the rice fields near Palazuelo. We had an excellent spread of waders, including **Avocet**, **Ruff**, **Spotted Redshank** and **Little Stint**. But most impressive was a huge group (over 1100) of **Glossy Ibis** and nearly 400 **Black-winged Stilts**. Plus hundreds of egrets and **Black-headed Gulls** following a tractor ploughing up muddy rice stubble.



24th November 2023: Alcollarín Reservoir.



It was a wonderful day of warm sunshine and no wind, absolutely perfect for a day at the Alcollarín Reservoir, just a just a thirty-minute drive away and set in a dehesa and granite

landscape. There was an excellent selection of waterbirds including **Common Shelduck**, **Pintail**, **Eurasian Wigeon** and **Red-crested Pochard**, thousands of **Shoveler**, as well as three species of grebe. We saw at five **Black Storks** and a party of **Spoonbills**. Birds of prey included **Osprey**, **Marsh Harrier**, **Sparrowhawk** and both **Griffon** and **Black Vultures**. Small birds were also enjoyed such as **Sardinian Warbler**, lots of **Common Chiffchaffs**, **Kingfishers**, **White Wagtails** and **Serins**.

We had one distraction from the reservoir, to visit the village of Campo Lugar for coffee. On the southern edge of the village we had superb views of a flock of at least 30 **Stone Curlew**.

25th November 2023: La Garganta

It was another day of superb weather: no wind, clear skies and warm sunshine, even though we had to scrape the ice off the windscreen before setting off. Our destination today was the extreme north of Extremadura, on the Sierra de Bejar, near the village of La Garganta. On the way we encountered some banks of fog close to the valley of the Tagus river, but we were quickly beyond their reach.

Stopping close to the border of the province of Salamanca we took an eight kilometre circular walk through high mountain pasture and scrub and woodland. The views across the north of Extremadura were superb and trees were in autumn colours.



Bird wise, it was a question of quality rather than quantity. On this habitat in winter, there can be long periods with little action. But during the morning we were rewarded with superb views of **Dartford Warbler**, **Rock** and **Cirl Bunting**, **Goldcrests** (including one feeding on the ground), **Firecrests**, **Crested Tits** and **Short-toed Trecreeper**. On some fruiting trees as we were completing the walk we had good views of **Siskins** and **Bramblings**.



We returned to base via the Monfragüe National Park, stopping for half an hour at the Puerta de Serrana where **Griffon** and **Cinereous Vultures** circled over us on the late afternoon thermals.

26th November 2023: Arrocampo Reservoir and Monfragüe National Park

It was another crisp morning as we headed north-east on the motorway towards the reservoir of Arrocampo, beside the village of Saucedilla. Before we had arrived we had entered a dense bank of fog. This hung over the wetland during our entire visit, creating a very atmospheric setting, but limiting visibility enormously.

Despite this we quite quickly found a male Little Bittern and during the morning walk also species like Western Swamphen, Reed Bunting, Eurasian Spoonbill, Black-crowned Night Heron, Cetti's Warbler and heard several Water Rails. Common Chiffchaffs were everywhere and there were also large flocks of White Wagtails and Meadow Pipits. A White Stork clacked its bill as it stood on its nest. There were some wonderful mixed flocks of Spanish and House Sparrows and Goldfinches feeding on seed heads.

We took advantage of the nearby café to warm our hands on glasses of café con leche and then took another brief visit to the wetland, before continuing onto the Monfragüe National Park.

Here the fog had recently risen and dispersed, so there was a hazy sunshine during our visit. Griffon Vultures were just starting to open their warms and dry them off.

At various stops we watched both **Griffon** and **Cinereous Vultures**, a distant **Golden Eagle**, and many smaller birds like **Blue Rock Thrush**, **Sardinian Warbler**, **Eurasian Jay**, **Siskin** and **Chaffinch**.

Surprisingly we could hear rutting **Red Deer** stags, and we saw a few females and youngsters.

27th November 2023: Villuercas Mountains

The day started with thick fog and as we drove south through Zorita and onwards to Logrosán, if anything it became thicker and thicker. It looked set in for the whole day, so the only option was to get above it. So heading for the top of the Villuercas Mountains was the plan.

As we left Guadalupe, we rose and then ascended to the peak of the Villuercas, and as we did so we moved from fog to brilliant sunshine, as we drove though woodland of deciduous oak, some with still some autumn colours.

At the peak, we had the wonderful sight of being above an ocean of clouds as far as the eye could see, with just the mountain tops and ridges below us emerging. Only **a Black Redstart** was present, but the experience of the vast panormana was reward enough.



We made our way back down hill (seeing two **Roe Deer** as we descended) and stopped at the wooded valley where we encountered a good mixed flock of birds, including **Long-tailed Tits**, **Great Tits**, **Blue Tit**, **Nuthatch** and a **Short-toed Treecreeper** heard but not seen. However, a pair of **Eurasian Bullfinches** was a lovely surprise.

We returned though the small town of Guadalupe and then onto the western side of the mountain range, still enjoying wonderful sunshine. At our picnic stop we had good views of two **Dunnock**.

Entering an area of cork oak, we stopped to watch the **Griffon Vultures** and at last got good views of a **European Nuthatch**. Just a little way further on our sought-after **Bonelli's Eagle** at last made an appearance.



We visited the little village of Cabañas del Castillo, and crossed the River Almonte, before leaving the sunshine and crossing many kilometres of dehesa and then the plains to the northeast of Trujillo, this time under murky overcast conditions.



28th November 2023. Lagoon at Alcazar de San Juan and onward to Madrid

It was a mild but foggy morning as we bade our farewells to Casa Rural El Recuerdo. The thick fog remained for the first two hours of the journey but once we had entered the rolling arable

land of La Mancha it had cleared and the sun came out. Traditional windmills and castles were situated atop pointed hills, a landscape reminiscent of Don Quixote indeed!

We arrived at the lagoon beside the town of Alcazar de San Juan just before noon and straightway were watching our target species: the **White-headed Duck**. Over the hour of so that we spent at the site we had great views of several dozen of these odd-looking duck, with their grossly swollen bills.

There were also good numbers of **Black-necked Grebes**, some **Western Swamphen**, ducks including **Red-crested Pochard** and **Common Pochard**, a few dozen **Greater Flamingos** and close to a flock of Lesser Black-backed Gulls, two **Whiskered Tern** in winter plumage.

Marsh Harriers, a large flock of **White Stork** and three Common Cranes all added to the visual feast. It was an excellent postscript to the Extremadura holiday.

From there it was an easy run to Madrid on almost traffic-free roads until we hit the busy traffic as we entered the city. Notwithstanding this, we reached the airport for the drop-off at just before 3pm.

- 18. Black-necked Grebe: Seen at Alcollarín and at Alcazar de San Juan.
- 19. Great Cormorant: Seen on three days.
- 20. Little Bittern: Seen at Arrocampo.
- 21. Black-crowned Night Heron: Seen at Arrocampo.
- 22. Cattle Egret: Seen on three days.
- 23. Little Egret: Seen on three days.
- 24. Great Egret: Seen on three days.
- 25. **Grey Heron**: Seen almost daily.
- 26. Black Stork: Seen at Alcollarín.
- 27. White Stork: Seen most days.
- 28. Glossy Ibis: Big flock on the rice fields.

- 29. Spoonbill: Seen on three days.
- 30. Griffon Vulture: Seen every day.
- 31. Cinereous Vulture: Seen almost every day.
- 32. Osprey: Seen at Alcollarín.
- 33. Spanish Imperial Eagle: Seen on three days with superb views!
- 34. Golden Eagle: One seen in Monfragüe.
- 35. Bonelli's Eagle: One seen in the Villuercas Mountains.
- 36. Red Kite: Seen daily.
- 37. Marsh Harrier: Seen almost daily.
- 38. Hen Harrier: Males seen on the rice fields.
- 39. Common Buzzard: Seen daily.
- 40. Sparrowhawk: Seen on three days.
- 41. Black-winged Kite: Seen on the rice fields near Madrigalejo.
- 42. Common Kestrel: Seen most days.
- 43. Merlin: Seen on two days.
