TRIP REPORT

30th November 2024: The plains between Trujillo and Cáceres

It was generally a bright sunny day with very little wind, making it feel quite warm by the afternoon.

We spent the whole day on the plains between Trujillo and Cáceres, stopping first north of Trujillo on the Monroy Road. Here there were groups of **Eurasian Golden Plover** and we found also parties of **Pin-tailed Sandgrouse**, feeding in the sunshine and flying with their raucous calls.

A male **Hen Harrier** was watched quartering the fields. We had excellent views of **Corn Buntings** on the fences. A little further along, a group of **Red Kites** had clearly been attracted to a roadkill. There was a very obliging **Dartford Warbler** and **Common Chiffchaffs** were numerous. Stopping briefly beside the River Magasca, we watched Eurasian Crag Martins hawking insects.

After an excellent coffee stop in the pretty little main square of Santa Marta de Magasca, we stopped beside the River Tamuja for our picnic. Both **Griffon** and **Cinereous Vultures** joined the **Red Kites** passing along the valley sides.

Back on the plains again, to the south of the river, we had a lovely view of a **Little Owl**, and briefer views of a subadult **Spanish Imperial Eagle**. We then stopped at the entrance of a dirt road. Here we saw a group of **Black-bellied Sandgrouse** in flight. Having seen a distant pair of **Spanish Imperial Eagles** displaying far to the south, we were surprised to find another pair

perched on a pylon in the opposite direction, and much closer. One of these birds then glided across our field of view, putting up **Northern Lapwing**, **Black-bellied Sandgrouse** and, most spectacularly, a group of 45 **Great Bustard**. These flew towards us and then passed us in perfect light.

Smaller birds were not ignored. We had good views of **Thekla's Lark**, **Calandra Lark**, **Stonechat** and **Meadow Pipits**. We completed the afternoon on the plains just west of Trujillo. Here we saw two more **Great Bustard** and a small flock of **Black-bellied Sandgrouse**.

1st December 2024: Garciáz and rice fields near Palazuelo

Unlike the day before, the morning dawned heavily overcast with some light drizzle. Although it remained generally dry throughout (just some short periods of light rain), it remained overcast, until some breaks in the cloud in the afternoon.

We ascended first the hills behind the village of Garciáz. This beautiful mixed forest was rather quite bird wise, until we had finished our walk and quite close to where we had parked, came across a mixed species flock. Here we had lovely views of **Crested Tit**, briefer views of **Firecrest**, as well as **Long-tailed Tit** and **Lesser Spotted Woodpecker**.

We then descended and walked for a while in a mixed oak grove. Here we had better views of **Firecrest**, as well as species such as **Great** and **Blue Tit**, **Short-toed Treecreeper**, **Eurasian Hoopoe** and **Song Thrush**.

After coffee near the village of Campo Lugar, we explore the southern edge of the village and found a wintering flock of about 50 **Eurasian Stone Curlew**, which we had good views of in flight.

Just to the south lay the rice fields of Palazuelo, where we spent the rest of the afternoon. The most memorable of the visit were the huge numbers of **Common Crane** (perhaps over ten thousand birds). There was also a good scattering of waders such as **Kentish Plover**, **Ruff**, **Dunlin**, **Spotted Redshank** and **Wood Sandpiper**. **Western Marsh Harriers** were numerous. We also saw a distant **Squacco Heron**. There were large numbers of wagtails (mainly **White Wagtail** but a couple of **Western Yellow Wagtails** were found), **Water** and **Meadow Pipits**, and the amazing sight of vast flocks of **Spanish Sparrows**.

26th November 2024: Arrocampo Reservoir and Monfragüe National Park

The day started as rather overcast, with moments of very light rain, but it soon progressed to generally sunny conditions. We started first at the marsh beside the Arrocampo Reservoir. Here we spent time on the eastern shore, beside the fringing vegetation. We managed to get sightings of **Penduline Tit**, **Western Marsh Harrier**, **Western Swamphen**, a brief view of a **Bluethroat** and we heard **Water Rail** and **Bearded Tit**. **Common Chiffchaffs** were amazingly abundant and we had superb views of **Sardinian Warbler**.

After coffee at the cafeteria close by (where **Barn Swallows** hawked insects), we had a second stop beside the western end of the marsh, where there was huge flock of **Goldfinch** and **Serins**. At an isolated water body, there were large numbers of **Common Snipe** present.

We then moved on to the Monfragüe National Park, making our first stop (where we also had our picnic) at the beautiful viewpoint at Portilla del Tietar. Here we watched both **Griffon** and **Cinereous Vultures** and had a good view of a **Golden Eagle**. We progressed through the park making three other stops, and seeing **Eurasian Sparrowhawk**, **Hawfinch**, amongst other birds, as well as several **Red Deer**, before reaching the majestic Salto de Gitano viewpoint.

The impressive cliff opposite was the focal point for dozens of **Griffon Vultures** and we enjoyed a long stay there, seeing also smaller birds such as **Black Redstart**, **Long-tailed Tit**, **Sardinian Warbler** and **Blackcap**.

We made our final stop below the Monfragüe Castle to enjoy seeing the Griffon Vultures at even closer proximity, as they perched and preened on the cliff, as well as flying away and returning. Distant groups of vultures circled over the vast landscape to our south.
